CAPTAIN DAVID M. McDUFFIE
COMMANDING OFFICER
NAVAL COASTAL WARFARE GROUP 2**

Captain McDuffie began his Naval career on-board USS BARNEY (DDG 6) homeported in Norfolk, Virginia, where he served as Auxiliaries Officer and Communications Officer. He also served as the SEAFOX Division Officer and Operations Officer at Special Boat Unit TWENTY. In 1990, he reported to the OPNAV Staff in Washington, DC, to serve as a Special Program Assistant for the development of the Coastal Patrol Boat (PC) Program (OP 31).

He has completed three Department Head assignments as Combat Systems Officer onboard USS MCINERNEY (FFG 8) in Mayport, Florida; Operations Officer onboard USS WILLIAM H STANDLEY (CG 32) in San Diego, California; and Battle Group Communications Officer for Commander Cruiser-Destroyer Group TWO/George Washington Battle Group in Norfolk, Virginia.

His shore assignments have included a tour as a Strike Warfare Instructor at Tactical Training Group, Atlantic, Dam Neck, Virginia, and as a student at the College of Command and Staff, Naval War College, Newport, Rhode Island. While there he earned a Masters Degree in Strategic Planning.

In 1998, Captain McDuffie reported to USS STUMP (DD 978) as Executive Officer. He then served as Surface Warfare Placement Branch Head (PERS 413) at the Naval Personnel Command, Millington, Tennessee. In 2003, he assumed command of Assault Craft Unit TWO in Little Creek, Virginia. Most recently, he served as an Instructor and Curriculum Development Officer at the Navy's Command Leadership School in Newport, Rhode Island. During this tour he deployed to Iraq and served as the Deputy Director of the Commander's Initiatives Group for Multi-National Force – Iraq.

His awards include the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal (one gold star), the Navy/Marine Corps Commendation Medal (four gold stars) and the Navy/Marine Corps Achievement Medal (one gold star).

It is Captain McDuffie's great fortune to be married to his wife, Allison. They are blessed with two beautiful children - Meredith (Champ) age 10 and Stanton (Dash) age 6.

This document (lauded by a top DoD official as “one of the best documents of its kind that I have seen in 27+ years of commissioned service” and as “a great roadmap for the future”) guides all future information technology investment across the Department of Defense and the Intelligence Community--an investment valued in excess of \$200 billion. He is also the author of a Multinational Information Sharing (MNIS) International Cooperation white paper, commissioned by the DISA MNIS Joint Program Office and published in May 2006.

Terry holds a master’s degree in Management from Webster University, St. Louis Mo., and a bachelor’s degree in Business Administration from Sophia University, Tokyo, Japan.
